SPECIAL NOTE: Our January meeting is one week behind our usual schedule. We apologize to those who have other meetings on the fourth Monday. For the rest of the year we will meet on third Mondays.

TREE COMMITTEE REPORT: The treelet distribution this 1983-1984 dormant season has gone very well. Orders have reached about 2000, the bulk of which have been dug, bagged with ground rotted leaf mix and distributed. An additional 118 trees were donated by the Club to encourage Arbor Day and other plantings. The over 30 recipients of this total distribution have been schools, garden clubs, neighborhood associations and school PTA's. Of the greatly expanded varieties offered, 35 orders were received for each variety. Many of these, 12, in limited supply sold out.

Restocking of small treelets for future distributions is well underway. To date 2385 treelets have been ordered, and are mostly planted at Hatcher's expanded nursery. 1150 white pines are from the State Nursery and 28 other varieties in lots of 10 to 30 are from 8 wholesale nurseries. These and forward limited acquisitions have been approved by the board. This will include about 50 of one-of-a-kind varieties for experimental-demonstration purposes and secondly building a modest inventory of those more popular varieties previously supplied.

Cuttings of an expanding variety of Crape Myrtle and of photinia will again be set out to bolster supply of these items.

About fifteen members have participated in the distribution and treelet planting work. This help and hopefully more of this good therapy is the best way we can begin to show appreciation for the leadership of Harold Hatcher in these endeavors.

Two meetings involving our City Manager, Streets Department, Parks Department, City planning and City Tree Committee have been held with club directors looking to development of the tree bank at Fairforest Park and to more City tree plantings. The new tree bank should be ready for some first plantings this Fall.

Fairforest Park may receive the larger dogwood and hardwood trees in our inventory and ready for permanent sites. Further, the possibility of starting an Arboretum is under continuing study.

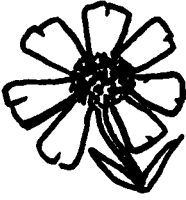

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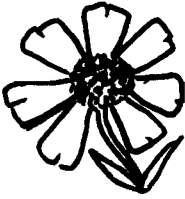

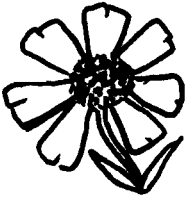

Color Slide Presentation on Local Wildflowers

The wife of long-time Men's Garden Club member, Walton Scott, shares her popular slide series taken primarily on their 20 acre "nature preserve" south of town.

TREE PROJECT EXPANDING

Orders were received on 32 of the 33 varieties and sizes of trees on our 1983 Arbor Day Tree List. We "sold out" on most of the varieties and distributed 2106 trees at an average price of \$1.50. Nearly 200 were supplied without charge to schools and other governmental units.

This favorable response has encouraged the Board to use \$1300 of the proceeds to order 2800 small trees, including over 20 additional varieties. These have all been planted by volunteers at our Reidville Road Tree Bank. Fairforest Park should be ready for receiving young trees by this winter.

A number of grafted and/or patented specimen trees have been acquired and planted for use at the appropriate time in Spartanburg's future arboretum.

We want to help Spartanburg keep its designation by the National Arbor Day Foundation as "Tree City, USA".

THE MONTH OF MAY brings up our annual landscape Judging and Street Flower Bed planting of annual to replace the pansies.

JOHN & DOROTHY NEVISON represented our Club at the National's convention in Mobile on April 1-4.

REGIONAL LAWN & GARDEN SHOW, Saturday April 14, 9:30 to 4:00 at Spartanburg Tech with exhibits, seminars and contests. It is sponsored by Clemson Extension and the college's horticulture department. 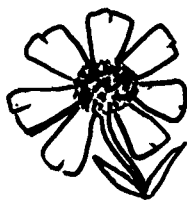

Members, wives and friends will enjoy LaBruce Alexanders discussion of the Nature Conservancy projects and goals. Let's have a good turn out for this stellar program.

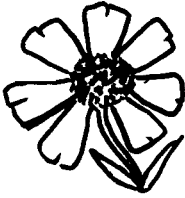

Beautification Committee of Harry Pittman, Julian Foster, Jack Bracken and Frank Cunningham has undertaken, with Directors approval, targeting a community site for beautification. The procedure is to examine the site area, then approach property owners, city departments, and whomever to see what can be done to clean up, landscape or whatever to beautify the area. The first site area being targeted is North Pine Street. Let's support this effort and be on the look-out for other areas of our city where a little "cultivation" by a civic group such as our club can effect further beautification.

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Tree Projects 1984-1985

Our tree committee, headed by Harold Hatcher, reported to our September 6th Directors Meeting as follows:

Our current small tree inventory totals about 2525 plants of 44 varieties. The 420 of these of larger size should go to permanent sites this coming dormant season. The balance are small enough to be carried over another season if not distributed. Additional white dogwoods and possibly magnolias are expected from our seeds planted by the state nursery, quantity yet to be determined.

Preparation of Fairforest Tree Bank for further planting is scheduled for September-October with weather the usual factor.

Demonstration plantings of different varieties are under consideration at Fairforest Park. Landscape architect Shirley Carter is going to advise on this project. Committee personnel Bob Powell and Jack Bracken are also participating in this planning.

It was noted that our September 1983 mailing to assembly members, school campuses and neighborhood groups had netted a distribution of about 2500 treelets last year, about 100 of these to community Arbor Day or other plantings.

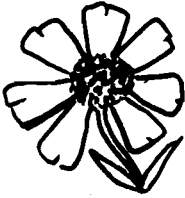
Discussion jelled into this forward plan:

Again circulate a September tree letter to the same addresses and emphasize distribution of the 420 larger trees to Civic Beautification projects.

Up to three trees will be given free for Arbor Day plantings. Some fifty to one hundred are expected to go to Fairforest demonstration plantings or city street sites.

All groups will be invited to advise us if any lots of 25 or more small trees they should like to have and we can consider their volume will indicate our arrangements for group pick-ups.

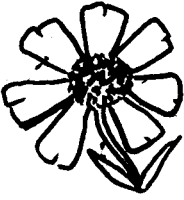
Mrs. Anne Swenson became the 11th winner of the Claude A. Sherrill award for the best four blooms.
