A Salute With the passing of 1988, we look back at the projects of the year and are grateful for the accomplishments of our Spartanburg Men's Garden Club, and in particular we want to thank our outgoing President, Walter Soderberg, for his leadership in both '87 and '88. And of course, Walter, past Presidents have to work even harder than current officers.

We welcome 1989, and swing our membership support to our new president, Tom Bartram, who promises to keep us busy and productive.

Dormant Season Tree Activity From our October announcement of a 10th annual Tree Distribution, prepared by Harold Hatcher and distributed to about 150 addresses, school campuses, PTA's and neighborhood associations by David Kennemur, these plantings and distributions have occurred: Arbor Day, December 2, 1988 saw 24 schools have Arbor Day plantings. City officials participated in the planting at Mary H. Wright Elementary school. Habitat for Humanity, under the leadership of Dr. Jack Turner, also planted trees on Arbor Day at their two new homes at Celestial Ave.

The sale of bare root treelets to others has run about 85% of expected volume, with total approaching about 3000.

In the new year these plantings have occurred: thirty white dogwoods have gone to Duncan Park in a planting arranged by Everett Seixas with the Forest Hills Neighborhood Association.

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A planting at The Warehouse was arranged by Frank Cunningham and Everett Seixas. The County personnel did the planting.

About nine members and civil helpers have partially bagged bare root and partially heeled-in about 750 nursery treelets at the Hatcher Gardens.

A second area at the West Main/I-26 intersection is ready for 125-135 of our larger treelets. Holes are dug, leaf mold is ready at each hole, and members are invited to participate in these plantings on the coming Saturday mornings. This project is financed by a Tourism grant of \$2,000.

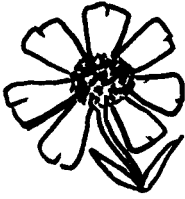
Scheduled are replacement red maple plantings on North Pine Street and nursery treelet plantings in the Fairforest tree bank for next year.

Members, have your favorite garden plantings ready to describe to this early garden forum. Bring your ladies and friends, a few items for the door prize pool and gather some good pointers.

Mrs. Leah Cheek will have some information on future waste recycle programs to share with us.

A Note Of Thanks to Peter L. Schaudt, our January 16 speaker, who gave us a good discussion of the landscaping proposed for the new downtown Spartan Food Center building.

U/DAT report on suggested development alternatives for our city has been out for about three weeks as this bulletin goes to press. It will be carefully considered with respect to future beautification projects.

Dormant Season Tree Activity - continued. The mild weather of the past month has permitted good things to happen. a) At West Main and I-26, the second area has received 140 trees planted, mulched and watered. b) On North Pine St. about 35 replacement red maples have been planted, mulched and watered. This is to reinforce this project of the last dormant season. Several members have helped Harold Hatcher and his civil service personnel on these jobs. c) City and County personnel have been using the open weather to move leaf mold onto the tree bank area at Fairforest Park, to deep plow and then level and smooth a considerably expanded growing area. d) Our Jess Taylor has engineered an expanded and simplified irrigation system for Fairforest Tree Bank. Materials cost for this work of \$650 was approved by our directors. e) As this is being read there will be about 4500 one-year-old white dogwoods delivered from Salem State Nursery to Hatcher Gardens for planting in the Fairforest tree bank. Please advise Harold when you can help with their planting.

Landscaping under the Spartanburg City Water System Storage tanks. This project was briefly discussed just a year ago, but was put on hold awaiting more information on pending developments in the area. Jack Turner has been in touch with the Water System people and has copies of landscaping plans supplied by a Clemson student project. Club directors have approved a start be made on this project now. This is being arranged with Water System Management.

Seasonal Oddity. Your bulletin editor and wife returned from a several days trip to Florida on February 7. On February 8 they cut over half a pound of new asparagus shoots in their garden!

Pansy Disappointment. The bare root pansy plants received in mid-November '88 and planted in immediate following days have yet to produce any blooms. We are asking Parks Seed to advise better results for '89.

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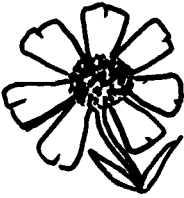

First, of course, was having the new activities building at Hatcher Gardens as a bagging and distribution base for our bare root trees. Second, but only slightly, was Harold Hatcher's affliction with Bobcat fever. He carefully inquired about purchase, rental, transport and maintenance regarding work at Hatcher Garden, Fairforest leaf and tree banks, and even Spartanburg Tech Horticulture projects. A month's trial rental and Harold's unerring good judgement cured this fever. A very beneficial result is his big-cab truck obtained for towing a Bobcat trailer. It has, and is doing, good service carrying public service personnel and leaf mold to the Club's several planting projects.

Mr. Ingle is responsible for highway landscaping, reception centers, and other activities of the DOT in Western North Carolina. He will talk to us about his wildflower planting projects and new methods for erosion control. Friends and ladies are welcome. Also, what can you supply to a March door prize pool?

By-Laws Changes. As announced at the last meeting, the Board of Directors has proposed changes in our by-laws eliminating references to gender except for the Club name. A vote to accept these by-laws will be held at the March meeting.

Litter Pick-up — Adopt-A-Mile. We thank Leah Cheek for her presentation last month about the "Adopt-A-Mile" program. Soon a sign is to be placed on the stretch of North Pine Street that is our Club's responsibility. The first scheduled pick-up date under this program is Saturday, April 1st. Please reserve this morning to help.

Glenn Park. County Manager Westmoreland and County Attorney Smith inform us that the county now has title to six plus acres of prime woodland along the stream that flows into Cleveland Park from the North. The land is a gift of the Glenn family. Bob Powell, Harold Hatcher, Bill Otts, Tom Bartram and others have helped in getting this arranged. These and others will advise the county on its opening this "green space" area for the enjoyment of the public. The Club donated a modest fund for legal fees.

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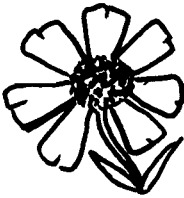
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Tree Bank Activity. As of this date, the '88 - '89 dormant season has ended. Our treasurer reports the total treelet distribution was 139 free items, 2770 sold and also 410 bags of leaf mold sold. Harold Hatcher, several members, and a continuing sequence of civil workers have set out about 5000 Crape Myrtle cuttings and over 2500 small ornamental trees of ten different varieties in the tree bank at Fairforest Park. This brings the planned Spring planting work to better than three quarters finished. Jess Taylor reports the modification and expansion of the Tree Bank irrigation system is now complete and within the budget cost of \$650.00

April Wildflower Walk. Plan to reserve Saturday, April 22, 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for a guided wildflower expedition led by Bob Powell. There are three different sites under consideration. A bus will provide transportation from our usual meeting place, Church of the Advent. Walking severity will not be great, about like Pearson Falls. Bring your own picnic lunch.

But, instead, come on a wildflower walk Saturday, April 22, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Pearson's Falls, North Carolina. Bob Powell of the Biology Department at Converse College will be our leader.

Because this is an intense field trip season, no bus is available. So, we will car-pool starting from the Church of the Advent, Kennedy and Advent Streets, at 10 a.m. Expected arrival time at Pearson's Falls is 11 a.m. Those going directly there from other starting points will meet our group at the gatehouse. Travel directions are given below.

The modest pavillion is reserved for our group and visitors' fees will be paid by our club. Bring your own lawn chair, lunch and beverage. Dress for the weather of the day. This should be the perfect time for such a trip — bring any interested friends. Walking is relatively easy, individuals can choose paths that suit.

Directions from Kennedy and Advent Streets: Take I-26 West to Columbus Exit No. 36.; turn left on NC 108 and go 2.5 miles, then turn right on County Road 1121, follow 0.7 miles to US 176 (at Harmond Field); turn right and go 3.7 miles to Pearson's Falls Road (at the well-marked Melrose junction). Turn left on Pearson's Falls Road, follow signs, stay right after the railroad trestle, and go 0.4 miles to Pearson's Falls.

A Note of Thanks to Mr. Ed Ingle, North Carolina Department of Transportation, for an interesting talk with beautiful slides on Monday, March 20. They have beautiful wildflower plantings. Lists of the plant material utilized are available from Tom Bartram.

Litter Pick-Up Saturday, April 1, started at West's store on Pine Street at 9 a.m. Charles Burdell thanks the 15 members who helped gather 24 bags of debris. Only one \$1 bill was found.

Recycle Paper and Aluminum At this writing, Dick Look has 12 volunteers lined up to take 2-3 hour periods loading trucks at Hillcrest and Westgate Malls on Saturday, April 15, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Members able to join this activity can do so by giving Dick a call at 579-7123.

Governor's Award for Community Improvement We commend the City Beautification Committee members who have done the work required to attain this award. Soderberg and Moorehead are two club members in the delegation who journeyed to Columbia for the luncheon award meeting on April 11.

Landscaping Projects under consideration for this year are:

- a.) Additional portion of cloverleaf area at West Main and I-26.
- b.) Crape Myrtle plantings in the Route 29 median west of I-26.
- c.) Initiation of tree planting on East Main Street utilizing either Norway Maples or Shademaker Locust trees.

Members Tom Bartram and Hatcher have prepared applications for the funding of these projects by the S.C. State Tourism Fund.

Separately, Turner, Nevison and Bartram expect the Water System people to take modest initial steps in landscaping the downtown water towers' property. This would follow RUDAT recommendations, including suggestions of landscape designer Peter Schaudt.

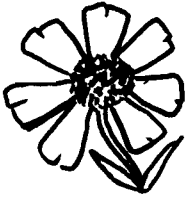

You will recall the Griffins were in Denmark last year exchanging houses with the Jensen family who were here in Spartanburg working at Milliken. They will show and tell us of the Gardens they visited.

Also, there will be a period of gardening question and answers pertaining to this busy gardening time. Members, have your answering thinking caps with you. Items for the door prize pool are welcome.

A Note of Thanks to Bob and Sondra Powell who were our leaders on the April 22 visit to Pearson Falls. Our group numbered nineteen and all enjoyed the picnic lunch and stroll along the valley to the Falls.

Governor's Community Improvement Award, the ninth successive along with another Tree City USA award, received at the Columbia luncheon meeting April 11, was mentioned in our previous bulletin. We want to add a "congratulations" to Lulu Bell Scruggs for her preparation of the Scrap Book.

Flower Beds. Bedding plants have been distributed and planted pretty much as outlined in our April 12 bulletin. A rain delay was experienced at Duncan Park May 6. The plants for Mountainview were delivered by Everette Seixas. Dave Kenemur coordinated and Taylor, Nevison and Turner delivered and distributed the 48 trays supplied from Settles Greenhouses. Another five or so trays were purchased by individual members.

The Spartanburg Phillies baseball diamond in Duncan Park had inquired about landscaping. This was satisfied by Harold Hatcher and civil helpers by planting 35 to 40 large white Crepe Myrtles. Look for these on your next visit to the ball park.

Glenn Park This gift to the County Park System has been transferred and proper signs are to be posted. A legal fee paid by our club to help facilitate this transfer has been fully reimbursed. County Manager and our club representatives have discussed the forward development and use of this "green space". These items are on the agenda:

- a) A steering committee of club members are to advise the park's development. Bob Powell is to lead this group which includes Bill Otts.
- b) A landscape plan, including preservation of choice plants, is to be prepared.
- c) Initial clean-up of garbage in the area is to be made.
- d) Volunteer club members are requested to lead workers in implementing the landscape plan.

Members, please note, Bob Powell is leading an initial group on an inspection of the Park at 2:00 p.m., May 10. Gather at the rear parking lot of Western Sizzlin' Steak House, Asheville Hwy., if interested.

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Tree Bank Harold Hatcher has lead the considerable work at the tree bank relocating larger plants to prevent crowding and getting additional Crepe Myrtle cuttings placed. A sizeable group of Leland Cypress are to be moved from pots to the tree bank. Civil workers' help is shifting more toward weekend hours, hence Harold can use more member helpers for these days.

Water Towers, R/UDAT Recommended Landscaping. Jack Turner assisted by John Nevison and Tom Bartram have received a three-stage landscaping proposal by Clemson and then have discussed with Water System directors an adaptation for first stage (area under the two towers) landscaping to be done this spring. Following Water System directors approval this has been done: 80 small red tips are planted inside the fence on North and West boundaries; 11 five to six foot Leland Cypress and 29 eighteen inch Leland Cypress are planted between W. and N. boundaries and the tanks. 10 large white Crepe Myrtle are planted in front of the fence on Liberty Street and 14 are inside the South fence, West end; 26 white and pink Dogwoods are planted on South side of Western lot; 24 Forsythia are planted outside the South fence, East lot. Channel 7 TV news caught a brief shot of this work.

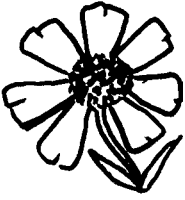
These plantings conform to requirements to leave a 20-foot wide drive circling the two towers and stay five feet away from all underground piping. The choice of plants was influenced by both the Clemson landscape drawings and advice the club obtained from Peter Schaudt of the Spartan Food Building landscape firm.

Remaining to be done are wood-chip mulching of all plants and completing and planting two entrance flower beds.

The total project is well within the \$1100 budget granted by Water Systems Directors.

In Memoriam We are sad to note the passing of William Baldwin who, with his family, has kept that beautiful flower bed visible to people traveling Country Club Road.

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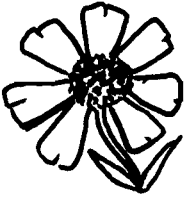

The other beds are getting helpful watering and weeding by their respective owners or member monitors. **Water System's two central storage tanks areas** - the two raised beds by the Liberty street entrance complete our Spring effort there. **Pine Street Red Maples plantings** lost several trees last year. Harold Hatcher and several civil helpers have made replacements. **Wildflowers** showing in areas of roadside at the I-26 intersection with W.O. Ezell Boulevard are being encouraged to grow by state workers refraining from mowing these areas. Harold has accomplished this stratagem.

Endowment Fund, earnings therefrom for the operation of Hatcher Horticultural Garden. Our directors have recommended a donation to the Spartanburg County Foundation for this purpose. It is hoped that this can grow extensively through other gifts in the future.

Receipts are going to finance the "Keep Spartanburg Clean" program. It behooves our city and county street workers to get all area leaves to the bank this Fall — no need to send them to a land fill.

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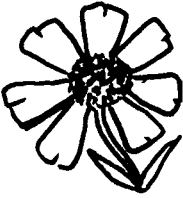
tivities, we have received a \$2,500 grant from the Spartanburg County portion of South Carolina Tourism Funds.

Dormant Season Tree List for Distribution 1989-1990 Harold Hatcher, with the help of members of his choosing, will prepare an available tree list for our 1989-1990 dormant season distribution. This to be ready for distribution by mid September.

Fall Flower Beds A survey is underway for possible November pansy plant supply for our community flower beds.

Tree Projects A major East Main Street planting is being developed by Henry Pittman. This project, using about 212 trees, will be presented by letter to the East Main St. property owners for their approval and participation in the financing. Jess Taylor and John Nevison are helping on this project. Initial approval of highway and city streets people has been obtained. 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crepe myrtle for small tree sites. We compliment Henry for his time and effort in working with city, county and state highway officials for agreement on this project.

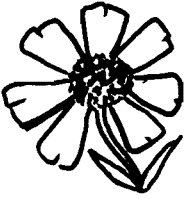

17th Annual Rose Show on Saturday, September 16 at Westgate Mall opens to exhibitors at 7:00 a.m. Chairman Bob Reynolds thanks his committee and the Club membership for their help and support in promoting the show. Area business people are thanked for their sponsorships which have provided the prizes for the 35 or so categories of blooms entered in the show. Bob reminds us that the judging will begin at 10:00 a.m. At the close of the show, about 7:00 p.m., all blooms will be sold to the public.

Pansies for November planting in community flower beds are being grown by Settles Nursery. Our order is for 1500 yellows, 750 blues and 750 mixed colors. Members tending and/or arranging for supply of the different beds should advise John Nevison of their preferred needs. Planting on 10 inch centers require 1½ plants per square foot; 8 inch centers require 2¼ plants per square foot.

A big thank you to Bob and Sandra Powell for hosting our most successful August 21 picnic at their Hilltop Acres home. We also thank the club officers and members who provided food and did the chef-ing. The sixty-five attendees had a most enjoyable time.

Tree Projects: Harold Hatcher's tree committee is reviewing tree bank inventory and planning nursery stock supplements for our Dormant Season '89-'90 Tree Distribution and Sales. The usual memo mailing to county school campuses and neighborhood groups will proceed this month.

Henry Pittman's committee and their "Beautiful East Main Street" project is in full swing. Thanks to good member participation, a mailing has been made to all property owners describing the project and soliciting their ideas and support. The initial funds (\$3500) are available from state tourism and club funds. However, several thousand more is needed from property owners and public-spirited sources.

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West Main and I-26 Intersection plantings (a third intersection plot and added lane dividing islands near Shoresbrook) are included with the East Main Street supply requirements currently being negotiated.

Fall dogwood seed collection is solicited by our tree chairman, Harold Hatcher. Eight gallons of red seed berries are needed. They go to the state nursery at Salem, where they are depulped and planted for our 1990 white dogwood treelet supply. About 4,000 treelets from last Fall's seed collection are expected to be available this December at nominal cost.

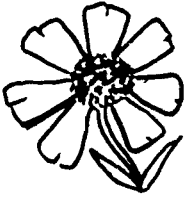

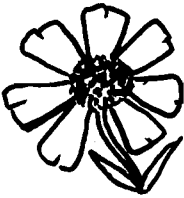
